One Design (OD) boats are built exactly the same and are limited to the type of sails, the number of sails, and can have limited to no modifications. Dana West Yacht Club Skipper Mark Williams and his crew did a stellar job tactically on several challenging courses over the two-day event competing among some of Southern California's best skippers. Their crew work and skillful performance aboard Buenos Aires won them the honor of West Coast Champions in the one class design fleet! 

Kevin: Too long to tell, but heavily inclusive of travel with my wonderful wife. Every time I check one item off the list, I add three more. Europe again.





Performance Hull Paint By Bob Langan

This is the time of year when boaters make plans to put a fresh coat of antifouling paint on the bottom of their hull. Sailors who race want to go faster, power boaters with large engines want to get better fuel mileage and power boaters with secondary electric motors for cruising short distances want to get a little more distance out of their batteries. This story is for you.

When Sue Griesbach and I bought our Catalina 385 in 2013 we didn't envision racing her. But within a year we were racing almost every week and had embarked on upgrading every aspect that would make her faster. The bottom paint is a key part, and we had switched from a standard ablative paint to a hard paint that could be sprayed and burnished to create a smoother surface. Like many racers and non-racers, we had been using Trinidad SR, which is 65% copper, a potent biocide.

About four and a half years ago, Pettit announced a new paint targeted at boaters who wanted to make their hulls more slippery while retaining antifouling properties: Black Widow (BW). It contains four slickening agents, molybdenum disulfide, PTFE, silicon, and graphite. It also contains two biocides, copper (25%) and zinc (2.5%). It is sufficiently hard such that it can be burnished to a mirror finish. Divers clean the hull by wiping it gently once a month (or before each race) with a wool glove. In my mind I felt our boat might benefit because we have more wetted area than a similar-sized racing boat.

This all sounded great in the press releases, but I wanted something that would be reasonably durable. I wanted at least two years of racing life. Three years ago I found several racing boats in Newport Beach that had just opted for this paint, and I followed them for the next two years. They were extremely satisfied, and the paint was holding up well after two years. On top of that, the shipyard that did the work, Basin Marine, had fallen in love with the handling characteristics of the paint when being sprayed.

So, in December 2020 we opted for the BW. It is compatible with Trinidad SR, so only some sanding of the old paint was necessary before spraying in their outdoor "booth". Spraying uses 50-100% more paint than rolling, and it took almost 4 gallons. These paints are expensive (about \$500/gal if provided by the shipyard), and spraying is significantly more labor intensive.

To obtain the mirror finish the paint is sanded with 3000+ grit sandpaper, followed by burnishing with a polishing compound and power buffer. The sanding removes overspray and other roughness, but even if one skips the sanding step, a mirror finish is obtained. We chose to skip the sanding to get a little more life out of the paint. In the picture, Sue looks closely at her reflection in the gun-metal finish at the shipyard.



When the paint is new, it is supposed to "cure" in the water for several months before it gets wiped down for the first time. After about two months I asked our diver, Ed Riener, to take a look at the build-up of winter growth, and he created a video of his inspection: https:// vimeo.com/505026240. There was a film of growth that just "blew" off with a wave of his hand.

Was it worth it? Absolutely. It has noticeably improved the performance of our boat in winds under 10 kts. Several of our regular competitors have even noticed the difference.

I have dived under the boat twice this year to look at the bottom, once in May and the other in October. It is very smooth and shows no sign of deterioration, and our diver agrees. In another year we will probably have our boat hauled out for other maintenance, and we will make a decision as to whether a paint refresh and new burnish are called for.



As we near winter, here are a few "seasonally appropriate" nautical terms and their origins!

"Port" and (Christmas) "STARboard"

The word 'starboard' is the combination of two old words: stéor (meaning 'steer') and bord (meaning 'the side of a boat'). In the past, ships used to have rudders on their center line and they were controlled using a steering oar. As most of the sailors were right-handed then, the steering oar used to control the ship was located over or through the right side of the stern. For this reason, most of the seafarers were calling the right side the 'steering side', which later became known as 'starboard'.

The left side is called 'port' because ships with steerboards or star boards would dock at ports on the opposite side of the steerboard or star. As the right side was the steerboard side or star board side, the left side was the port side. This was decided so that the dock would not interfere with operating the steerboard or star.

Another reason why the left side is 'port' is because it sounds different from 'starboard'. Originally, sailors were calling the left side 'larboard', an English term for loading, which was easily confused with 'starboard', especially when challenging conditions at sea made it difficult to hear.

"FREEZE the Balls Off a Brass Monkey"

In days of old, cannonballs were piled on deck beside the cannon in pyramid fashion and retained in a ring called a brass monkey. If the weather was very cold, the brass ring would

contract faster than the iron cannonballs, causing some of them to topple. From this the expression was, and is today, used to describe something that is very cold.
